We were greeted by a group of well wishers at the front door. The people cheered as the kids and officers made their way inside. The little girl I was with had a list and as I looked at her list, I realized she did not have anything for herself on the list. She told me it was important she pick things for her family members and friends first. In the past I have heard stories of kids trying to buy cat food because their families can't afford to pay for it. I have heard of officers asking kids if they decorated their tree only to find out they don't have one. These same officers have dug into their own pockets to purchase many things. We share smiles and laughs and even a few tears with these kids and love every minute of it. I can only speak for myself, but I personally treasured this experience and I am eternally grateful to the people who help make it happen!"



What we do for children
